At Look at Our OLOHP Interviewers...

No matter how you look at it, the work of the OLOHP couldn't happen without the interviewers. For many years, Arden shouldered that responsibility on her own, but now that's changed. So let's start by giving a shout out to all the women currently doing interviews for us, and to those who are getting ready to do their first interviews. And with luck, we'll be adding a couple more names soon as Arden does her training in early March.

Interviewing isn't everyone's cup of tea. Over the years, Arden has worked with quite a few women. A few did an interview or two, and some never took that first step, which can feel a bit overwhelming.

Through these years of experience, a basic set of criteria for interviewers was developed:

- Interviewers need to be lesbians.
- Ideally, they should be old enough to relate comfortably to the women being interviewed, in their late 50's, 60's or older.
- if at all possible, an interviewer needs to share her story with the Project first, so she can better understand the process and experience how it feels to be on the other side of the equation.

We try to meet our own criteria, but we're open enough to see the value in staying flexible. For instance, we don't have a star on the map in the St. Louis area, yet we have someone doing an interview there very soon. Sharon contacted us, letting us know about friend in her late 70s willing to share her story. We were unlikely to be able to get someone into that area in the next six months, and since Sharon has done similar interview work, we made an exception and Sharon will do the interview for us. Our hope is she'll not only get that story for us, but that she'll be willing to do more, and we can add St. Louis!

If all goes according to plan, we're also hoping to gain an interviewer in the Denver area this year, as well as one in Chicago. Even then, there are still some wide open areas in the country where we either miss opportunities to gather a story, or we rely on other interviewers who are willing to work an interview or two into their travels.

We're proud to say every one doing interviews for the Project enjoys it. Some do a dozen a year, others one a year. No matter how many, they are all loved and appreciated for what they are doing.

We've learned that these women from the OLOHP have passed. They will be missed.

M: My partner had cancer, and she believed in holistic healing, and then waited too long. I didn't even know about it, because I was living here in Fayetteville by that time, and she was in Eureka Springs. We had split up, and we had tried to keep a friendship going, but it didn't work too well. And so I didn't know.

She showed up at the door one day with this box of books. She says, "I'm cleaning out, and I found these books that are yours." I took the box and I said, "Come in." She said, "No, no, I have to go." She had a friend driving, which was not her usual way of doing things. It was six months later that I heard that she had cancer.

I finally opened up that box. I had never opened it. It was not books that belonged to me. It was books that we had talked about, read, enjoyed, read to each other, and all that kind of thing.

I: She just wanted you to have them.

M: The memories. [voice breaking] And [slight crying] she was the love of my life.

I: Mm-hm.

M: Sometimes you can have real intense feelings for a long while. [voice breaking]

I: But isn't it wonderful that you had it?

M: Yes. I would not trade it for a lifetime with someone that I really couldn't even stand by the time we got through the lifetime. I have a tendency to wear people down, and so I probably would have gone through two or three or four marriages. [Laughter] I think I'm what people call "high maintenance." [Laughter]

"I began to identify as a lesbian when I ended my third years of nursing school and I didn't want anybody to know about that. At those times, you certainly didn't. I followed that secrecy thing for about six years, seven. Pretty much still, until we moved here, to Whidbey Island and then I just didn't care."



Screen Sharing Rules! by Margaret

Bit by bit, we add to our arsenal of tricks to make things run more smoothly in the OLOHP. Our latest successes have been with a remote control screen sharing application.

The call went out. "Help! I lost an important folder full of files on my computer. I had it one minute, and now it's gone." Given that Arden and I live over 2000 miles apart, we had to get inventive. We'd been playing a bit with screen sharing, but decided it was time to put it to the test. The good news is, it worked!

It's rather frightening that it's so easy, but in a matter of a few minutes, we were both able to be on the phone with each other, open the application on our respective computers, determine the location and password that we needed to exchange, and I was able to see Arden's screen. We opted to use TeamViewer for Mac, but there are several good applications out there. It was like show-and-tell as I explained what I was doing, and why, and she watched her cursor move without touching her mouse. Bingo. The lost folder was found (having been accidentally moved into another folder) and put back where it belonged. Crisis averted.



But wait... Arden has two email accounts on a desktop computer and on a laptop. One device would receive mail from both accounts, but only send from one. On the other device, the situation was almost the exact opposite. It took some doing, but we did eventually win the day and get her email working on both, incoming and outgoing.

Now, if someone can explain how those email settings get corrupted after working for months without a hitch, we'd be even happier!


